

Notes for Guidance



Letter from Fr. Chris

'Jesus said 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God still and trust in me. In my Father's house, there are many rooms'.

These words come from the gospel that is chosen most often by families who are preparing for a Roman Catholic funeral and I commend them to you at this difficult time and assure you of my prayers.

This letter, borne out of twenty years' experience of celebrating funerals, is meant to help you to understand what is and what is not part of a Roman Catholic requiem, and to make clear what is and what is not permitted so that you can choose whether this is what you want for your loved one. Some people will tell you that you can do what you want and have what you want at the funeral. This is not the case if you choose to have a Roman Catholic funeral in our parish as you will be choosing a sacred service in a sacred place. The liturgy and the surroundings have a bearing on what is appropriate. If you choose to have a requiem in one of our churches, the norm is for it to be a Requiem Mass. The Mass is the source and summit of our faith and the very best context in which to remember your loved one.

There are practical considerations in the parish when a funeral is being arranged. These include making sure that Mass is celebrated each week day for local parishioners who can support you in prayer. If you have a funeral in church, you will have the opportunity to choose hymns and sacred music. Secular music is not an option for a funeral in church in our parish. Please be aware of this. If, however, the full service takes place at the crematorium, you may choose secular music which should be appropriate for the occasion.

There is always the opportunity for one member of the family to give what is called the Eulogy. This is a reflection on the life of the person who has died. It takes place at the beginning of Mass in church or at the beginning of the service at the crematorium. It needs to be appropriate to the setting and should not be of great length. To keep the focus and mindful of practical timings, around four minutes is the time available for this.

For a Requiem Mass in church, there is a set order of prayers and readings. You may choose hymns and readings from the suggested list, but you may not change the structure or replace the scripture readings with secular texts. You may choose to have an additional reading or poem suitable for the occasion.

In church, there are no flags, photographs or any other objects on the coffin. This is so that the book of the Gospels and cross can be placed on the coffin as the focal point. Flowers can be placed in front of the altar during the liturgy.

We have a group of parishioners who will help you to prepare for the funeral and look after you on the day if you chose to have a requiem Mass in our parish.

I feel that it is very important to help you by being clear about the boundaries of what is possible and appropriate in order to avoid upset before and during the funeral. With this in mind, if you do choose to have a funeral in our parish, then it will be a very special time of prayer and faith in which to remember your loved one.

Funeral arrangements will only be confirmed from the parish point of view on the understanding that you accept what has been explained in this letter.

Please be assured of my prayers.

A Requiem Mass - what it includes.

The liturgy for a Requiem Mass begins with background music, played by the organist, as the funeral procession enters the church. This is followed by the Eulogy. Mass then begins with the Opening Hymn. This is followed by a Reading, a Psalm and a Gospel, which may be chosen by the family from the list provided. Family members and friends are welcome to do the reading and the psalm. The priest always reads the gospel.

After the gospel, the priest delivers the Homily, which is a short sermon prepared especially for the occasion.

The most sacred parts of the Mass follow. These are the Offertory and the Consecration. The family may choose hymns for both. The liturgy continues with the prayers before the Consecration and the Consecration itself which is followed by the distribution of Holy Communion and the Communion hymn.

After Holy Communion, there is time for reflection. This may include a short poem or a piece of music suitable for the occasion.

The Prayers of Farewell and Committal bring Mass to an end.

The procession leaves the church as the congregation sings the closing hymn.





Funeral Service at the Crematorium

(where there has been no service in church) - what it includes

The Service begins with Entrance Music chosen by the family. This can either be a hymn or a favourite piece of music suitable for the occasion. The Eulogy follows. This may be delivered by a member of the family or a friend and is followed by a reading, a psalm and a gospel all of which may be chosen by the family from the list provided with this booklet. Family members or friends may do the reading and the psalm. The priest always reads the gospel.

The priest then gives the homily, a short sermon specially prepared for the occasion.

After the homily, there is an opportunity for reflection. During this quiet time, a poem may be read or a favourite hymn or piece of music played.

The service ends with the Prayers of Farewell and Commendation.

A final hymn or other piece of music may be played as everyone leaves the chapel.

All of the above will be discussed when you meet with members of the pastoral team. They are familiar with the organisation of funerals in both of our parish churches, and will be pleased to give you guidance and advice. They will also do all that they can to ensure that your loved one's requiem, whether it be a Mass or a Service, is a prayerful, peaceful and respectful occasion.

No one can come to the Father except through me'.



A Reading from St. Paul to the Romans 8:31-35. 37-39

With God on our side, who can be against us? Since God did nor spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us, he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand, he stands and pleads for us. Nothing, therefore, can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of him who loved us.

For I am certain of this; neither death or life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Responsorial Psalm

Response: I rejoiced when I heard them say, 'Let us go to God's house'

I rejoiced when I heard them say, 'Let us go to God's house'. And now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem. **Response**: I rejoiced when I heard etc.

Jerusalem is built as a city, strongly compact. It is there that the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord. **Response**

For Israel's law it is, there to praise the Lord's name. There were set the thrones of judgement of the house of David. **Response**

Martha said, 'I know he will rise at the resurrection on the last day'. Jesus said, 'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies, he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 'Yes, Lord'. She said, I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.



A Reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 15: 20-23

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and, in the same way, the resurrection from the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order: Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him.

A Reading from the Book of Wisdom
